Prepare the way for the Lord

Lent will begin soon — on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17. The season, which prepares us for the jubilant celebration of Easter (April 4), has a focus on baptism and penance.

This year, the traditional distribution of ashes will be different. Rather than marking a Catholic's forehead with a cross, the priest will sprinkle ashes on the head. This change comes from the Vatican and addresses the health situation caused by COVID-19.

After blessing the ashes and sprinkling them with holy water, the priest will address the congregation with "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," or "Repent, and believe in the Gospel." The priest will clean his hands, put on a face mask and distribute ashes in silence.

Ash Wednesday originated in the Sixth Century, with the ashes signifying mourning and grief. Traditionally, the ashes are made from the palm fronds of the previous year's Palm Sunday.


Fasting and abstinence are part of our repentance during Lent.

- † Catholics who are 18 through 59 should observe fasting, unless there is a health or other serious reason not to do so.
- † Fasting means you may have one full meal and two smaller meals (not equal to a full meal) each day.
- † The 40 days of fasting include every day of Lent except Sundays, beginning on Ash Wednesday and continuing through Holy Saturday.
- † Catholics who are 14 and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and each Friday during Lent.

The Church also suggests Catholics follow fasting or some other form of self-denial throughout Lent.

It is also recommended that Catholics practice their faith daily through devotions, participation in Holy Mass, praying the rosary or giving service to others.
