
Divine Mercy Sunday

The Feast of the Divine Mercy falls on the Second Sunday of Easter – the Octave of Easter. It celebrates the Lord's mercy for sinners.

Although the feast has been part of the Church for centuries, God reminded us of this message nearly a century ago when he appeared to a Polish nun in 1931. Today she is known as St. Maria Faustina Kowalska.

During this time, God's graces to us are bountiful. Pope John Paul II tell us, mercy is "love's second name." This love helps us as we face poverty, brokenness and sin.

When Jesus appeared to Faustina, He was clothed in a white garment with His right hand raised in blessing. His left hand was touching His garment in the area of the Hear where two large rays emanated — one red and one pale.



He told St. Faustina, "The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment."

He then gave the Sister a novena for nine days of prayer and a Chaplet to use when praying the rosary.

God's message to us of Divine Mercy is important. However, we must also become living examples of His word.

One priest gives us the ABCs of Divine Mercy.

Ask for Mercy. In Scripture, Jesus says, "Ask and it will be given to you... for everyone who asks receives.

Be merciful in deed, word and prayer. Not only must we have compassion for others, but actively assist people when they are suffering.

Completely Trust that God will be with us, particularly when we are troubled.

Gospel

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you."

When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side.

The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

Jesus said to them again, "Peace

be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord."

But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them.

Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you."

Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe."

Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.
