

The Significance of Easter

Although we associate Easter Sunday with overflowing baskets of PEEPS, chocolate bunnies and adorable stuffed chicks, the holiday has a much more spiritual meaning for Catholics.

Lent marks our preparation for the death of Jesus in which we review and strengthen our faith. Easter is the completion of Holy Week, ending with the Resurrection of Jesus. It is a time to remember that He died to save us from sin and rising from the dead is a triumph over evil, sin and death.

Easter is the most important feast our Church year. While many Catholic holidays evolved over the course of history, it is believed that Easter was regularly celebrated from the earliest days of the Church.

The date changes each year, falling between March 22 and April 25. The Church marks Easter as the first Sunday following the first full moon of the Spring Equinox.

A recognized greeting of the season "Christ is risen" to which one would respond "He is risen indeed!" It reminds us that Jesus is alive and welcomes us in a new life with Him.

Some of the secular parts of Easter have a root in our faith. Eggs are symbolic of a new beginning and the Resurrection. Mary Magdalene carried a basket of eggs to the tomb of Jesus where she mourned. The eggs turned a deep red color, reflecting the miracle before her.

So, enjoy this holiday with your family traditions and make lasting memories. Fill up the baskets and hunt those plastic eggs. Just do not forget the sacrifice Jesus made for us — and the joy of his Resurrection.

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

First Reading

Peter proceeded to speak and said: "You know what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power.

He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem.

Second Reading

Brothers and sisters: If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory.

Brothers and sisters: Do you not know that a little yeast leavens all the dough?

Clear out the old yeast, so that you may become a fresh batch of dough, inasmuch as you are unleavened.

For our paschal lamb, Christ, has been sacrificed. Therefore, let us celebrate the feast, not with the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

Christians, to the Paschal Victim, offer your thankful praises!

A Lamb the sheep redeems; Christ, who only is sinless, reconciles sinners to the Father.

Death and life have contended in that combat stupendous: The Prince of life, who died, reigns immortal.

Speak, Mary, declaring what you saw, wayfaring.

"The tomb of Christ, who is living, the glory of Jesus' resurrection; bright angels attesting, the shroud and napkin resting. Yes, Christ my hope is arisen; to Galilee he goes before you."

Christ indeed from death is risen, our new life obtaining.

Have mercy, victor King, ever reigning! Amen. Alleluia.

R. Alleluia, alleluia.

Christ, our paschal lamb, has been sacrificed; let us then feast with joy in the Lord.

Gospel

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb.

So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him."

So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in.

When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place.

Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed.

For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.
